On October 28, Britannia Park was officially opened on it's 80th birthday! The opening ceremony was a wonderful event, with perfect weather and a variety of different activities such as a rope bridge, splat the rat, and giant snakes and ladders. In honour of its birthday and official opening, here are some fun facts about the 18 acre park...



- ▶ Brit Park was never officially opened! It was scheduled to open in 1939, but the ceremony was postponed due to bush fires. Then World War II started and the opening ceremony had to be cancelled altogether.
- ▶ It is home to a family of kangaroos, plenty of possums and you might even be lucky enough to see a koala!
- ▶ Some of the awesome treasure troves of Brit Park is that there is a Chapel where people sometimes get married, tree houses you can sleep over night in, the Lady BP tree, and there is even a swimming pool, but unfortunately it's filled with goldfish now.
- ▶ In the olden days, Britannia Park had a cow so you could always have fresh milk on camp, as there was no such thing as fridges or long-life milk.
