



SEGMENT INSTRUCTIONS

Alternative Campfires

If it's raining cats and dogs on camp, there's a high wind that would make fire lighting unsafe, there's a fire ban, or everyone's stuck inside in isolation... don't despair – you can still have a campfire!

Fairy Lights

Drape them around the room, wear them, cover a fallen log, or put them in a jar for a magical effect.

Glow Sticks

Use them like logs to make a rainbow coloured glowing 'fire', or have everybody wear as many glow sticks as possible!

Candles

Float tea light candles in a shallow bowl of water. **Make sure you ask permission from an adult before lighting candles.** You'll also need to keep your hair tied back, and keep clothing items like scarves away from the flames.

Torches

Place them strategically at the bottoms of trees to light up the trunks.

Portable Campfire

Ask for an adult to help you use a stanley knife to cut out the shape of flames on the side of a box. Cover the inside of the box with red and orange cellophane and a sheet of ordinary paper to diffuse the light from the torch you will place inside the box. Punch holes through the top of the box to let heat and light out. Poke sprays of red, yellow, and orange cellophane through these holes to look like flames. Paint the outside of the box black to add to the effect. Place a torch inside the box to 'light' your campfire!
