Dear Members of Girl Guiding in Victoria, it is with great pleasure that we present to you the 2022 Annual Report. This was a year of both successes and challenges as Guiding in Victoria navigated ongoing COVID regulations as well as a changing economic landscape.

Despite the difficulties, we have seen significant achievements in our organisation, including successful membership retention, increased quality of programming, and strengthened community partnerships. Our mission to empower girls and young women has remained at the forefront of everything we do, and we are pleased to see the impact of our efforts in the growth and development of our members.

We are proud to have provided over 3,850 girls and young women this year with real-life experiences that foster their development as leaders. Our programs and activities have continued to be a highlight of our organization. Our Guides have had the opportunity to participate in a range of activities, from traditional camping experiences, STEM, fire-safety, advocacy to digital activities developed in response to the pandemic. The highlight of this year was our State Camp held at our Britannia Park campsite, our congratulations and thanks to Dani Smith and Tara Anderson as co-LICs for this event. Over 700 Guides took part in the event and many for the first time enjoyed nights out under canvas and days exploring, hiking, caving, and flying high.

We are incredibly grateful for the support we have received from the community and our partners. Over \$90,000 in donations made this year, with over \$5,000 raised to support our flooded Guide halls and 2 bequests gratefully received. We also acknowledge the financial support of the DFFH Victorian Government and other foundation and philanthropic funding with \$398,000 granted this year.



Working with our Executive Committee we have also developed the new GGV strategic plan 2022-2027 and have launched several innovations to achieve updated digital systems and processes that will create an enabling environment for our volunteers. Heather Barton, as Strategic Lead has been instrumental in shaping this work and we thank the Executive members for their efforts this year. Janelle Howell was also an active sponsor of Project Umbrella and developing this vision and we would like to acknowledge her dedication to this and more broadly her significant contribution to GGV in her time as State Commissioner.

The staff team have also been slowly built up over the year, as we have restructured to create new positions that better support property, data management and child safeguarding. All at JPC are to be thanked for their hard work and flexibility in supporting the huge workload and range of what Guiding in Victoria covers. We celebrate their efforts that launched the new camp wear, provided ongoing Covid-19 guidance, managed all the Kids Get Active vouchers and made plans for the national Jamboree, all while delivering ongoing support to parents, carers, community partners, councils and all members.

We look forward to working together towards our collective ambition of realising a fully inclusive and inspiring environment over the coming year for Guides of all backgrounds to reach their full potential. Key to achieving this will be I&D training and leadership development. We will also be working to enhance our

fundraising initiatives and commercialise our assets so that we have the resources to provide the best possible experiences for all of our members. Lisa Berwick, and Julie Humphrey, in the role of Finance Chair, have been dedicated to ensuring GGV has the financial management and resourcing plan in place to best support the organisation to remain in a strong financial position in the coming years.

This year saw us celebrate Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth's Platinum Jubilee but also her sad passing in September. Queen Elizabeth and her late Mother had a long association with Girl Guiding around the world including her role as Patron from 1953. This connection will continue in the name of our Queen's Guide Award.

Thank you for your continued support of Girl Guides Victoria. Together, we can continue to make a positive difference in the lives of girls and young women across our state.

Staff, Leaders, Volunteers and families across

Victoria come together to share the oversight, financial management and maintenance of our 14 campsites, providing ongoing opportunities for Guides and the general public to enjoy camping in a safe environment. Thankyou to all our campsite committees for the work you do.

Covid had curtailed camping in recent years, along with a number of other Guiding activities. The resilience and creativity to move into the virtual world of Guiding maintained connections and friendships, and helped our units transition smoothly back in to in person Guiding activities this year with great enthusiasm. It is great now to see smiles in person!

Congratulations to the Yarraville Guides who flew high with their giant backpack at the Birdman Rally, raising money for Backpacks 4 Vic Kids, and to all our Units involved in numerous fundraising, advocacy and support activities throughout the year.

On International Day of the Girl 2020, WAGGGS asked Girl Guides and Girl Scouts under 18 from 100 countries what issues they were most concerned about and what they wanted to change about the world. From this data, we learnt that the number one worry is the environment. And so, the World Thinking Day theme from 2022-2024 became Our World, Our Future. In 2022, we explored our local environment and our connection to it, building on our past (and continued) involvement in Clean Up Australia Day, Earth Hour and National Tree Day. Girl-led advocacy, developing leadership through Lead the Way and girl-led programming are all great examples of how we live our mission to empower girls and young women. I give great thanks to our Leaders, Guides, Families and our support staff and volunteers for supporting each other in this mission and these activities.

It was also terrific to see the World Flag flying high outside the Ballarat Town Hall in July this year, in recognition of 100 years of Guiding in Ballarat. And we look forward to 100 more!

Guiding for the Future

2022 saw the launch of our next five year strategic plan. Focused on our priorities of Thriving People, Impactful Experiences and a Sustainable Organisation, we aim to build a connected and resilient future. Project Umbrella is now launched! Named after the umbrella that swung above the unit meeting place in Hawthorn in 1911, this project unites our organisation to turn our ideas into action.

Discovering their potential as leaders of their world, it was a proud moment for 12 Girl Guides to be acknowledged by the Governor of Victoria in a ceremony at Government House on achieving their Queen's Guide Award, the peak youth achievement award, with a further 15 Girl Guides achieving their Queen's Guide throughout the year. We also acknowledged the outstanding contribution of 30 volunteers with the presentation of 30 adult awards and 279 Years of Membership Badges in ceremonies across Victoria.

As Girl Guides, we make a promise to ourselves, and we aim to live up to that promise each and every day. We all bring our best to that which we do, and I am honoured to have been appointed to the State Commissioner role in September, leading a team of passionate and committed Guide Managers and Leaders. I have great admiration for the State Commissioners who have led us here and we look forward to doing our part to continue to inspire Victorian Girl Guiding into the future.

I would also like to thank and acknowledge our outgoing State Commissioner, Janelle Howell, and her team, for the wonderful job they did leading in very difficult times. MESSAGE FROM OUR FINANCE CHAIR AND TREASURER



What a year we had in 2022 – returning to face to face

Guiding with events being held like State Camp and Snoozefest
and adjusting to life with COVID. The ongoing economic impact of COVID is reflected in the financial statements for Girl Guides Victoria (GGV) for the year ended 31 December 2022.

The results reflect a 30% decline in total revenue; a 16% increase in total expenses; and a net deficit of \$1,548,540 (increase from a net deficit of \$452,650 in 2021)

Total revenue and income from ordinary activities were \$1,526,756 and down by 30% compared to 2021. This result was skewed by the \$1.3m decline in revenue from a fair value adjustment to the GGV investment portfolio caused directly by declining global and local economic markets and only offset by an increase to dividend and interest income of \$145,552. Pleasingly, membership income and income from events, training and programs increased by \$523,113 (113%) with the return to normal guiding activity and no lockdowns or fee waivers for COVID and is looking promising to return to pre-COVID income levels. There was also \$107,006 profit from the sale of a property at Poowong in 2022.

Total expenses from ordinary activities of \$3,075,296 only increased by 16% compared to prior year. Administrative expenses increased by 20% due to increased event costs, insurance costs and consulting costs to manage vacancies. Employment expenses also increased by 21% to reflect filling of vacant positions during the year. Total expenses have not risen proportionally to the movements in revenue as GGV has continued to manage discretionary spend in a disciplined manner and secondly, employment expenses have not risen as much as was anticipated due to the tight labour market and constraints in filling advertised positions.

As a result of expenses increasing and revenue decreasing, management have had to continue to draw down on invested funds during the year (\$1.47m in 2022) and is reflected in the reduced total current assets balance. This is not sustainable and GGV are implementing strategies to replenish these funds and ensure financial sustainability.

Net assets are \$27,279,486 and down by 5% from prior year, mainly due to the decrease in the current market value of the investments held by GGV.

Total liabilities have decreased by \$186,971 (23%) primarily due to decreases in contract liabilities for unexpended grants and unearned income from State Camp.

I would like to thank Lisa Berwick for her leadership as Treasurer and the members of the Finance, Audit and Risk Committee for their commitment and support during the year.





GIRL GUIDES AUSTRALIA SOCIAL IMPACT REPORT 2022

In 2021 Girl Guides NSW, ACT, NT, Girl Guides Queensland and Girl Guides South Australia established the inaugural measurement. In 2022 Youth Members and Adult Members from across Australia were invited to participate in the Girl Guides Australia social impact survey.

Data collection and analysis was conducted across four measurement groups:

- . Young Girls aged 8-12 years
- . Teens aged 13-17 years
- . Adult Members aged 18-30 years
- . Adult Members aged 30 years+

Measuring wellbeing allows Girl Guiding in Australia to better understand the holistic needs of members. Through the measurement approach, opportunities are identified for resource allocation to support enhanced member benefit.






