MESSAGE FROM OUR GOVERNANCE CHAIR



I am pleased to present an update on the governance activities for Girl Guides Victoria (GGV) for the year 2023.

As the Governance Chair, having been appointed in December 2020 and re-elected in December 2023, it has been an honor to oversee our progress and initiatives.

The year commenced with the highly successful Kani-Karrung Jamboree, which brought together Guiding members from across Australia to Victoria. This event not only provided a variety of activities across multiple locations but also underscored the evolution of regulations and the increasing necessity for resilience-building and mental health support within our programs.

Following our 2022-2027 strategic plan, this past year has been one of growth and learning, and we look forward to building on these foundations to ensure a robust and vibrant future for Girl Guides Victoria. In approving the strategic priorities and subsequent budget for 2024, the Executive Committee continue to build on the work of Project Umbrella in order to drive long-term change by enhancing member support, modernising systems

and processes as well as identifying and managing risk. Key strategic projects being led by the Executive committee in 2024 will be to diversify alternative revenue, devise strategies to attract new members and elevate strategic asset management. The disposal of underutilized GGV property, which increasingly poses a financial burden, is an immediate measure to bolster our funds while we develop more sustainable financial solutions.

I would like to welcome the new and express my appreciation to the current and outgoing members of the Executive Committee each of whom has contributed to the successes detailed in this year's annual report. In May 2023, we welcomed Glenn Kruithoff as our Treasurer. With the backing of the Finance and Risk Committee, he has been instrumental in managing our financial standing and providing ongoing risk management oversight. This includes proactively addressing emerging financial liabilities.



Lindsay Tagg has persevered in her role as the nominated Director for GGA, and I would like to acknowledge her contributions in this capacity. Special recognition is due to Ann Cook, who will step down from the Executive Committee and her role as Chair of the Policy and Procedures Committee in May 2024. Ann has completed her full 9-year term on the Executive Committee, and we are profoundly grateful for her dedication and commitment.

Linda Kors and her State Commissioner team have led our volunteers while supporting training programmes, national projects and attending many unit events. Their support along with the Guiding Management Team ensures we have a great programme to offer to our Guides.

Dr Amy Timoshanko, our CEO, continues to provide exceptional leadership to the

organization. The JPC team is expanding its expertise in critical skills necessary to navigate the current challenges we face and to foster growth for the future. I would like to extend my personal gratitude to the team for their relentless efforts this year, which have brought about significant enhancements to our digital landscape, the adoption of our strategic plan and numerous Guiding events.

In conclusion, I extend our heartfelt thanks to all our donors, funders, community partners, volunteers, and members of GGV for your unwavering support of Guiding in Victoria.

MESSAGE FROM OUR CEO



What a huge year 2023 has been for Guiding in Victoria.

Congratulations to Helen Reid (Jamboree Leader-in-Charge), the Kani-Karrung leadership team, and all involved in delivering a HUGE camping adventure enjoyed at a scale that had not been possible for a number of years. Being in nature, encouraging others and finding out what each of us can achieve, while also just having fun is what Guiding is all about. The breath of activity and level of collaboration between all across Guiding in Australia was tremendous. It was my first Jamboree, and with great appreciation I also thank Jackie, Myall, Lauren, Tayla, Megan, Paula, Kerrie and Karen, who went above and beyond in the lead-up and during Jamboree. I recommend reading pages 15-18 of this Annual Report for a summary and number of photos that capture the excitement and joy that was shared over this week.

I have once again enjoyed working closely with Dr Michèle Stokes as Governance Chair, as well as with the broader Executive Committee and subcommittee members. Together, we have navigated updates to governance, as well as changes in Victorian legislation and national policies. Ongoing consultation with the leadership of Girl Guiding in Australia has also been important as we navigated shared national projects and complexities within our federated model.

Acknowledging our strong commitment and shared responsibility to being a Child Safe Child Friendly (CSCF) organisation, all Adults in Guiding completed CSCF refresher training as well as support updates in fundraising and other initiatives for mental health. Ongoing collaboration with State Commissioner Linda Kors, the Guiding Management Team and other member representatives provided invaluable insight on state projects and Guiding process throughout the year. Please refer to pages 20 and 21, which demonstrate a snapshot of the collective efforts of all at GGV to deliver Guiding adventures through the year.

Meeting organisational requirements to deliver a quality Guiding experience can only be achieved through a collaborative effort marked by continuous adaptation. This dynamic approach has been central to our second-year initiatives within the 2022-2027 Strategic Plan. I am proud to highlight some of the key operational projects delivered this year:

- Launch of Britannia Park Tower as a new adventure experience and program of work to improve the Brit Park Campsite.
- Piloting of new revenue raising initiatives, including Holiday Programs and new Guide Shop merchandise.
- Our GGV owned properties were transitioned to a new safety and maintenance program.



- Significantly greater reach of GGV content through social media campaigns and advertising.
- A higher number of Guides participating in our programs compared to 2022, as well as more young adults volunteering.

Enhancing digital infrastructure was also a strategic imperative in 2023, with technology upgrades to deliver **secure**, **user-friendly**, **and accessible** systems through Phase 1 of our Digital Transformation plan. This led to:

- Over 85% of Guide leaders migrating to Microsoft 365, allowing for more efficient document sharing and collaboration.
- Consolidated email management across GGV which protects sensitive information and ensures compliance with regulatory standards.
- Launch of Guide Hub to streamline communication and improve information access for members.

A huge thank you to all our valued funders, partners and donors for your support that helps us to make a real difference to the lives of girls and young women. I also am deeply grateful for my JPC team, who are a small but mighty professional team. At a time when girls are feeling disconnected, less confident and reporting higher levels of mental ill health, the impact of Guiding and our purpose has never been stronger.

As we look towards 2024, it's clear that Girl Guides offers a unique environment where girls and young women engage in authentic experiences that foster connections and cultivate skills for resilience and confidence. I am excited for another busy year that promises to make a significant impact by elevating the Girl Guides' Voice, and delivering further progress through Phase 2 of the Digital Technology Project and other strategic projects to achieve targets set out in our strategic vision for 2027.

Manager) who all concluded their volunteer
management terms in 2023, and we have
since welcomed new members to the team.

our GMT members at the end of this report,
and give them a little thank you when you



see them. Alongside our Staff and Executive Committee, these volunteers provide key leadership, direction and programming for our organisation. They model our Promise and Law every day, in all that they do.

MESSAGE FROM OUR TREASURER





2023 has been a year of challenges and change for GGV, but also a year of great success, starting with the organisation hosting the national Jamboree in January.

I would like to extend a huge thank you to Julie Humphrey as the outgoing Treasurer and congratulate her on her incredible contribution to the financial governance and management of GGV over so many years. Julie continues to support the Finance and Risk Committee, and I would like to begin this report by thanking her and the whole committee for their ongoing support and guidance to Guiding in Victoria. This includes the enormous work of Jacki McAvenna and her team to manage the day-to-day financial records and reporting.

Total revenue and income from ordinary activities (not including investment and property income) was \$1,565,489, which was 8% down on prior year. This result was improved by significant increases in investment income and additional income generated from property holdings, which raised revenue to \$2,754,345 - a 60% increase over the prior year. In additional revenue of \$1,598,366 from the Jamboree was also recognised in this financial year bringing total revenue from all sources to \$4,352,711. Pleasingly, membership income increased by \$225,780 (33%) with a full year of Guiding program after the several years of COVID related interruptions.

Total expenses from ordinary activities of \$4,491,655 increased by 37% compared to 2022. This is almost entirely attributable to the recognition of Jamboree costs and, net of these, operating expenses were comparable to prior year. This is most notable in administrative expenses, which increased by 79% due to the inclusion of Jamboree costs. Employment expenses also increased by 22% to reflect filling of vacant positions during the year. Total expenses have not risen proportionally to the movements in revenue as GGV has continued to manage discretionary spend in a disciplined manner, and employment expenses have not risen as anticipated due to the tight labour market and constraints in filling advertised positions. In addition, an impairment charge for the reduction in asset value for the Springvale Guide Hall was also recognised, raising total expenses to \$4,821,791.

The net result for the organisation was a loss of \$469,080, which has resulted in a further reduction of our overall cash holdings. This result, however, is a significant improvement on prior year, helped mostly by strong investment growth. Nonetheless, management continue to implement strategies to replenish these funds and ensure financial sustainability. Net assets are \$26,810,407, down by 2% from prior year, mainly due to the decrease in the current market value of the properties held for sale. Total liabilities have decreased by \$1,373,279 (63%) primarily due to the inclusion of liabilities relating to Jamboree in the prior year accounts.

Approximately 80% of members completed this module, mainly via face-to-face sessions delivered around the state. Thank you to these members for taking the time to complete their modules.

My sincere thanks also to Lynne Emblin, Gwen Anderson and Karen Chatto, who presented the Child Safe Child Friendly sessions in their local areas. You have been a tremendous help and saved me many kilometres of travel! In 2023, Victoria had 48 registered Trefoil Guilds, with 462 members attached to each Guild. I travelled 1472 kilometres around the state, connecting with members and Trefoil Guilds and making amazing memories.

A highlight was the Victorian State Trefoil Guild Gathering, held at Britannia Park in August. Attended by more than 80 Trefoil Guild members, we brushed up on Guiding and volunteering with a workshop, and heard from speakers and guests Sharyn Smith-Anderson, the Australian Trefoil Guild Adviser, and Bec Cartwright, our Assistant State Commissioner. Many members stayed for a great social get-together over dinner, which capped off a marvellous day.

The 6th of May was another memorable day, with a palpable. It was my privilege to knight Lady Travel-a-lot. That afternoon, there were 60 lovely ladies all in their finery, raising the roof with their excited chatter at the North Metro Trefoil Guild's (NMTG) Coronation Celebration.

Prior to Coronation Day, the North Metro Trefoil Guild were at a crossroads, wondering whether they should close, or revive their Guild with a bang. Well, were they ever responsible for a big bang with their Coronation Celebration. Congratulations NMTG, you have shown us the way to revive your Trefoil Guild. We look forward to hearing more about your adventures.



For the duration of 2023, Sharyn Smith-Anderson provided us with a 'Shining Star' badge to wear. Many Victorian Trefoil Guilds took up the challenge to 'Shine' by

participating in lots of fun activities. This challenge will now continue throughout 2024, as it was so much fun.



REVENUE AND OTHER INCOME







She also revealed that the next Australian Guide Jamboree will be held in Northern New South Wales in September 2025.




BP AND JUNIOR BP AWARDS




